### GERMANTOWN CAMPUS SCHOLAR MS. YANXIN CHRISTINA YANG

## HONORS AND AWARDS

### *Board of Trustees Scholar Award*

The 2022 Board of Trustees Scholar Award is bestowed upon Ms. Yanxin Christina Yang, Germantown Campus; Mr. Gerardo Paul Rendon, Rockville Campus; and Ms. Kenisha J. Salvary, Takoma Park/Silver Spring Campus, by the Honorable Michael J. Knapp, chair, Montgomery College Board of Trustees.

To be considered for nomination as a Board of Trustees Scholar, students must be eligible for spring commencement by having earned an associate's degree or by having in progress final requirements for an associate's degree; must have taken at least 25 of the required credit hours at Montgomery College; and must have maintained a cumulative grade point average of 4.0 on all courses at the College. Board of Trustees Scholars receive a cash award to be applied to future tuition or educational purposes of their choice.

The Board of Trustees also recognizes three outstanding runner-ups for the 2022 Board of Trustees Scholar Award: Mr. Michael S. Koretsky, Germantown Campus; Ms. Fatihah Ullah, Rockville Campus; and Ms. Melany Y. Angel Beltran, Takoma Park/Silver Spring Campus. Each runner-up will receive a cash award to be applied to future tuition or educational purposes.

### *Presidential Academic Excellence Award*

The 2022 Presidential Academic Excellence Award is bestowed upon Ms. Mertinu F. Geleta, Germantown Campus; Ms. Nida N. Khan, Rockville Campus; and Ms. Layann A. Bashir, Takoma Park/Silver Spring Campus.

Students nominated for the Presidential Academic Excellence Award must exhibit evidence of outstanding scholarship in the form of a 3.5 grade point average or above at the time of nomination. The nominee must also show evidence of outstanding leadership in the College and/or in the community, evidence of outstanding service to the College and/or in the community, and matriculation in a curriculum and completion of at least 28 semester hours of credit earned at Montgomery College. The scholars will receive cash awards to be applied to future tuition or educational purposes of their choice.

## HONORS AND AWARDS

### *Honors Program*

The honors program distinction is given to students who graduate in one of the Montgomery College honors programs—Macklin Scholars, Montgomery Scholars, Renaissance Scholars, or the Collegewide Honors Program—with at least 15 honors credits in at least three different disciplines and a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.4.

### *Graduating with Honors*

Students earn the honors distinction by graduating with at least a 3.4 grade point average in any Montgomery College curriculum.

### *Phi Theta Kappa*

Phi Theta Kappa is the national honor society for students at two-year colleges. To be considered for election to Phi Theta Kappa, a student must have a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.5 for at least 15 credit hours of course work at Montgomery College and be enrolled in a degree program or transfer curriculum. A cumulative grade point average of 3.4 must be maintained to retain membership. Election to Phi Theta Kappa represents one of the highest honors that can be bestowed upon a student at Montgomery College.

### *Gamma Theta Upsilon*

Gamma Theta Upsilon (GTU), the international honor society in geography, was founded in 1928 and became a national organization in 1931. The purpose of this organization is to encourage professional interest in geography; to strengthen student and professional training through academic experiences; to stimulate research; to award scholarships for students pursuing geography as a major at the undergraduate and graduate levels; and to advance the status of geography as a cultural, physical, and applied discipline. Members have met academic requirements and share a common interest in the geographic field of study. The majority of these members are applied geography, cartography, geographic information systems, and geographic education majors.

In 1993, the applied geography program at Montgomery College's Rockville Campus became the first two-year program to be awarded a chapter of GTU, Theta Eta. The members of Theta Eta volunteer throughout the academic year for various activities. Some of the activities include performing community service; participating at national and international conferences; engaging in city, county, state, and federal government projects, as well as private industry; conducting fundraisers; and hosting special events and activities. GTU is proud to be celebrating 29 years of scholarly achievements at Montgomery College.

## ACADEMIC TRADITIONS AND SYMBOLS

### *Academic Regalia*

The academic procession in modern university life embodies a relic of medievalism. The somber gowns and colorful hoods are not unlike those worn by scholars and churchmen perhaps as early as the 12th century. The garb in those times had an element of utility. The robes were warm; the hoods could be drawn up to protect against drafts in unheated buildings.

Traditionally, the hood's silken lining has been in the color of the wearer's university. The color of the bordering velvet indicates the special area of study. White velvet represents arts, letters, and humanities; dark blue, philosophy; light blue, education; purple, law; dark green, medicine; apricot, nursing; lilac, dentistry; olive, pharmacy; pink, music; orange, engineering; citron, social work. Tassels on the "mortarboards," or caps, of the candidates for degrees correspond in color to the velvet borders of the hoods.

Gowns representing the master's and doctor's degrees vary in style. The master's gown has long, narrow closed sleeves, which extend below the knees. The doctor's gown has full bell-shaped sleeves with three bars of velvet and a front opening faced with wide velvet bands in either black or the color indicating the area of study.

There is no general rule for the position of the tassel on a mortarboard. However, it has become customary for candidates for degrees to wear the tassels on the right side before the degrees are conferred and to shift them to the left at the moment the degrees are awarded to them.

### *Montgomery College Mace*

The mace is the official symbol of the College's power and authority. The Montgomery College Full-Time Faculty of the Year Award winner earns the honor of bearer of the mace. Mr. Daniel G. Jenkins, associate professor of philosophy, will carry the mace in the May 19 commencement ceremony. As Mr. Jenkins is unavailable, Part-Time Faculty of the Year Ms. Kelly M. Livernoche, adjunct professor of biology, will carry the mace in the May 20 ceremony.

The fluted mahogany staff is adorned with antique silver-colored rings with engravings honoring past Montgomery College presidents. The base of the 42½-inch mace is fitted with antique silver to match the rings. The mace is capped by two black marble disks encasing antique silver panels that form an octagon. The panels are engraved with the names of the Montgomery College campuses. The finial is composed of a 3½-inch antique silver-plated medallion embossed with the College's seal, which is mounted on a diagonal mahogany surround.

The previous mace was designed by George Hatzenbuhler, an art student on the Rockville Campus in 1976. The original Montgomery College mace was designed and executed by professors emerita M. Gloria Monteiro and the late Dr. LaVerne W. Miller in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the College.
